INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SITUATION REPORT FRIDAY, JULY 23, 1999 - 0530 MDT NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS LEVEL II

CURRENT SITUATION:

Moderate initial attack activity was reported in most areas. New large fires occurred in the Great Basin and the Northern Rockies. Good progress was made on large fires in the Great Basin, California, Northern Rockies and the Northwest. The National Interagency Coordination Center mobilized infrared aircraft, air attack aircraft, lead planes, helicopters, radio equipment, caterers, a shower unit, Type I crews and miscellaneous overhead. High to extreme fire indices were reported in Oregon, Washington, Nevada, California, Idaho, Utah, and Wyoming.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA LARGE FIRES:

SPANISH, Santa Barbara County Fire Department, California. A Type II Incident Management Team (Smith)is assigned. This fire is eighteen miles west of Cuyama, California on Spanish Ranch. Control lines have been completed to the Sierra Madre Ridge. Crews are improving the Sierra Madre jeep trail and fuel break as the primary control line for the southwest portion of the fire. Burning operations are occurring to secure the existing fireline.

GOAT, Los Angeles County Fire Department, California. This fire is on Catalina Island, northwest of the Airport in the Sky. Attempts to burnout the line were hampered by high relative humidity.

EASTERN GREAT BASIN LARGE FIRES:

CEDAR BUTTE, Upper Snake River District, BLM. The fire is twenty five miles northwest of Blackfoot, Idaho. Structures, the Idaho National Engineering and Environmental Laboratory, power lines and a historic trail are threatened. Sage Grouse habitat loss is a primary environmental concern. Gusty winds and low relative humidities are hampering suppression efforts.

EIGHT MILE, Salmon/Challis National Forest. A Type II Incident Management Team (Casey) is assigned. The fire is twenty miles west of Challis, ID. Extremely low fuel moisture, strong gusty winds, very low relative humidities and steep, rocky terrain are hampering control efforts. Fisheries and potable water sources are threatened.

SAMARIA, Northwest Utah State. The fire is near Portage, Utah.

Containment was expected last night.

SOLDIER, Salmon/Challis National Forest. A Fire Use Management Team (Wallace) is assigned. This lighting ignited wildland fire is being managed to accomplish resource objectives. The fire is burning thirty miles northwest of Stanley, Idaho. Fisheries, historic structures and the Middle Fork of the Salmon River Corridor are threatened.

NORTHERN ROCKIES LARGE FIRES:

BURNED POINT, Lewis and Clark National Forest. A Type I Incident Management Team (Bennett) is assigned. This fire is twenty miles south of Augusta, MT. The fire is burning in grass, and timber.

TIN, Lewistown Field Office, BLM. This fire is twenty miles from Winnett, MT. Winds, low relative humidity, high temperatures, spotting and light fuels are hampering suppression efforts. Strong northwest winds caused the fire to increase in size from 100 to 500 acres in a two hour period yesterday afternoon.

ABEL RANCH, Southern Land Office, Montana State. This fire is fifteen miles north of Pompey's Pillar. The fire is burning in timber and range. This is a County assist fire.

WESTERN GREAT BASIN LARGE FIRES:

WAGON BOX, Elko Field Office, BLM. A Type II Incident Management Team (Carr) is assigned. This fire is fifteen miles northwest of Grouse Creek, UT. Five firefighters from the Heber Hot Shots received burn related injuries. All have been treated at the hospital and released. Resources threatened are archaeology sites, the California National Historical Trail, recreation and deer winter range. Steep inaccessible terrain, and gusty winds are hampering control efforts.

SAND SPRINGS, Carson City Field Office, BLM. This fire is fifty miles east of Fallon, NV. The fire started on the Fallon Naval Air Station

bombing range and has spread to BLM land. This wind driven fire is burning in Pinyon, Juniper, low shrub and grass. Military ordnance in the area is restricting accessibility. Current threats are to BLM and Navy communications sites.

OUTLOOK:

*** A RED FLAG WARNING IS POSTED FOR STRONG SOUTHWEST WINDS IN NORTHEAST CALIFORNIA AND WESTERN, CENTRAL AND EASTERN NEVADA. ***

*** A FIRE WEATHER WATCH IS POSTED FOR DRY LIGHTING IN THE AFTERNOON AND EVENING IN SOUTHWEST AND SOUTHCENTRAL OREGON. ***

Northern California will be sunny, except for isolated afternoon thunderstorms over the mountains. Winds will be southwest to northwest at 12 to 25 MPH with stronger gusts in the afternoon and evening. High temperatures will be in the lower 60's along the coast and mid 70's to near 90 inland.

Nevada will be sunny, except for isolated dry afternoon thunderstorms. Winds will be southwest at 15 to 30 MPH with gusts to around 45 MPH in the afternoon. High temperatures will be 66 to 85 in the mountains and 85 to 108 in the lower elevations.

Oregon will be mostly clear in the morning, becoming partly cloudy in the afternoon with a chance of dry thunderstorms. Winds will be light and variable in the morning, becoming northwest at 10 to 15 MPH in the afternoon. High temperatures will be in the mid to upper 60's along the coast and mid 70's to mid 90's inland.

Elsewhere in the western U.S. there will be scattered, wet thunderstorms in the afternoon and evening across New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and southern Montana. Northeast Washington and northern Idaho will have scattered mountain showers. High temperatures will be 60's to mid 70's along the coast, mid 60's to mid 80's in the mountains and 90's to 120 in the inland valleys.
