Area Command Team (Jalbert) has been mobilized to support wildland fire in Colorado.

East Troublesome, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. IMT 1 (PNW Team 3). IMT is also managing the Williams Fork fire. Seventeen miles northeast of Kremmling, CO. Timber and grass. Active fire behavior with wind-driven runs, group torching and spotting. Numerous structures, infrastructure and sage-grouse habitat threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Williams Fork, Arapaho and Roosevelt NF and Pawnee National Grassland, USFS. Fifteen miles southwest of Fraser, CO. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping, single tree torching and smoldering. Several communities and energy infrastructure threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Cameron Peak, Arapaho and Roosevelt NF and Pawnee National Grassland, USFS. IMT 1 (RM Team 1). Fifteen miles southwest of Redfeather Lakes, CO. Timber. Moderate fire behavior with flanking, backing and smoldering. Several communities threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Calwood, Boulder County. Ten miles northwest of Boulder, CO. IMT 2 (RM Team Black). Timber, brush and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with backing and creeping. Several communities threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Ice, San Juan NF, USFS. Five miles west of Silverton, CO. Timber and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with backing, isolated torching and creeping. Structures and energy infrastructure threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Middle Fork, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. Ten miles north of Steamboat Springs, CO. Timber. Moderate fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Structures and energy infrastructure threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Mullen, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. Transfer of command from IMT 1 (SA Blue Team) back to the local until will occur today. Thirty-eight miles west of Laramie, WY. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Several communities and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect. Precipitation occurred over the fire area yesterday.

SQF Complex, Sequoia NF, USFS. IMT 2 (EA Gold Team). Thirty-three miles east of Porterville, CA. Timber and chaparral. Active fire behavior with flanking, backing and creeping. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Predictive Services Discussion: An upper-level trough will drop south out of Canada into the West and strengthen. A weaker upper low will approach southern California and begin to move onshore tonight as it starts to merge with the larger scale troughing. Precipitation, falling mostly as snow, is expected across portions of the Pacific Northwest and much the Northern Rockies and northern Plains. Snow will also move into southern Wyoming, northern Colorado, and northern Nebraska tonight. A cold front will continue pushing south across the Intermountain West with elevated to critical fire weather conditions developing ahead of this front in portions of the Great Basin into the Colorado Rockies and Southwest. A cold front will continue moving east through the Atlantic Coast with scattered precipitation in portions of the Southeast and Mid-Atlantic from the Appalachians to the coast.

Fire Not Scouted And Sized Up

Operational Engagement Category

Watchout Situation #1 comes up during initial attack and **every time** resources arrive at a fire.

● Before taking action on the fire, the following considerations must be addressed:

- Can you personally observe the fire or must you use scouts? Describe ways you can scout and size up a fire.
- Do you know the location of the fire perimeter? Discuss situations in which the fire perimeter may not be obvious. (Spotty fires, etc.)
- Do you know the direction of fire spread? When isn't the direction of fire spread obvious? (Wind shifts, spotty fires, etc.)
- Does the direction of fire spread increase risk? Talk about situations where you may have to approach the head of the fire. (Hiking down from a helispot, approaching from an existing road, switching winds, etc.)
- Do you know the fuels and their condition? What kind of information will you assume from what you already know about fuel types? (Spot fires in fir, extreme fire potential in flashy fuels, etc.)
- What information can aerial resources provide about the fire?
- Do topographic hazards exist? What can you assume from the kind of terrain the fire covers? (Slope, chimneys, aspect, etc.)
- Does enough information exist to establish a plan of attack? When do you have enough information to begin fighting fire? What do you need to know?
- Do other dangers exist? Have you talked about factors specific to the area you are working in? (Hunters in the woods, drought, snag patches, etc.)

● To reduce the risks:

- Post lookouts until the fire is sized up and escape routes and safety zones are established.
- Retreat if the situation is too complex. Review fires where you had to wait until your assigned area of the fire was scouted and sized up before you were allowed onto the fireline.
