Area Command Team (Jalbert) has been mobilized to support wildland fire in Colorado.

**East Troublesome**, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. IMT 1 (PNW Team 3). IMT is also managing the Williams Fork fire. Seventeen miles northeast of Kremmling, CO. Timber and grass. Active fire behavior with creeping and spotting. Numerous structures, infrastructure and sage-grouse habitat threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Williams Fork**, Arapaho and Roosevelt NF and Pawnee National Grassland, USFS. Fifteen miles southwest of Fraser, CO. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Several communities and energy infrastructure threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Cameron Peak**, Arapaho and Roosevelt NF and Pawnee National Grassland, USFS. IMT 1 (RM Team 1). Fifteen miles southwest of Redfeather Lakes, CO. Timber. Active fire behavior with short crown runs, group torching and wind-driven runs. Several communities threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Calwood**, Boulder County. Ten miles northwest of Boulder, CO. IMT 2 (RM Team Black). Timber, brush and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with backing, creeping and isolated torching. Community of Lyons threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Middle Fork**, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. Ten miles north of Steamboat Springs, CO. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with backing, creeping and smoldering. Structures and energy infrastructure threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Ice**, San Juan NF, USFS. Five miles west of Silverton, CO. Timber and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Structures and energy infrastructure threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Mullen**, Medicine Bow-Routt NF and Thunder Basin National Grassland, USFS. Thirty-eight miles west of Laramie, WY. Timber. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Several communities and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Slater**, Klamath NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 7). IMT is also managing the Devil fire. Five miles northeast of Happy Camp, CA. Timber and brush. Minimal fire behavior with creeping and smoldering. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Creek**, Sierra NF, USFS. IMT 1 (CA Team 1). Thirty-five miles northeast of Clovis, CA. Timber, chaparral and tall grass. Active fire behavior with torching, backing and creeping. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**SQF Complex**, Sequoia NF, USFS. IMT 2 (EA Gold Team). Thirty-three miles east of Porterville, CA. Timber and chaparral. Active fire behavior with flanking, backing and single tree torching. Numerous structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Dolan**, Los Padres NF, USFS. IMT 2 (EA Silver Team). IMT is also managing the Coleman fire. Ten miles south of Big Sur, CA. Brush, chaparral and short grass. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

**Predictive Services Discussion:** An upper-level trough will continue to drive south over the West with cold temperatures moving in behind a cold front pushing through the Intermountain West. Precipitation will spread across the central Rockies, northern and central Plains, and into portions of the Great Basin and southern Rockies with much of the precipitation falling as snow. Light showers are also expected over portions of the higher terrain in southern California and southern Great Basin with a rain/snow mix in the southern Sierra. Strong, dry offshore and northerly winds are expected across much of northern California into far southwest Oregon through tonight. Showers and thunderstorms are expected across much of the Southeast into the Mid-Atlantic along a cold front.

## Hypothermia

*Firefighter Health & First Aid*

Hypothermia occurs when your core body temperature falls below normal. It can easily happen in cold winds or wetness. Hypothermia can also occur in moderately cool temperatures, particularly if coupled with dehydration. People tend to forget to drink on cool, wet days and can get hypothermic even when the temperature stays well above freezing.

● Symptoms of hypothermia include:

- Slurred speech.
- Weakness and loss of coordination.
- Confusion.
- Irrational behavior.
- Uncontrollable shivering (although, at extremely low body temperatures, shivering may stop).
- Pale and cold skin.
- Drowsiness – especially in more severe stages.
- Slowed breathing or heart rate.

Your body automatically begins to shiver to warm itself. As your energy is used up to keep warm, you may reach a point where your body will be unable to warm itself. If left untreated, your body will gradually shut down; and you can die.

● You can avoid hypothermia with the following precautions:

- Guard against dehydration.
- Avoid fatigue.
- Avoid cold winds.
- Take precautions, change out of wet clothes.
- Be aware of the symptoms and take action upon their onset.

● If you recognize hypothermia, take the following steps:

- Move the patient to shelter.
- Remove wet clothes and replace them with warm, dry garments.
- If the victim is alert, give them food and warm liquids to drink.
