Two hundred twenty-five soldiers from the 23rd Brigade Engineer Battalion and 2-3 Infantry Battalion based out of Joint Base Lewis-McChord are deployed in support of the Dixie Fire.

One MAFFS C-130 airtanker and support personnel each from the 152nd Airlift Wing (Nevada Air National Guard), three MAFFS from the 302nd Airlift Wing (Colorado Air Force Reserve), two MAFFS from the 153rd Airlift Wing (Wyoming Air National Guard) and two from the 146th Airlift Wing (California Air National Guard) have been deployed to McClellan, CA to support wildland fire operations nationally.

One RC-26 aircraft with Distributed Real-Time Infrared (DRTI) capability and support personnel from the 141st Air Refueling Wing (Washington Air National Guard) and one RC-26 aircraft with Distributed Real-Time Infrared (DRTI) capability and support personnel from the 162nd Operations Group (Arizona Air National Guard) have been deployed to Sacramento, CA in support of wildland fire operations. Also supporting these aircraft are eight ground controllers from multiple U.S. Air National Guard squadrons.

One Boeing 737 airtanker from New South Wales, Australia is supporting fire suppression efforts in the western United States.

Two fire suppression crews from Quebec, Canada are supporting fire suppression efforts in Washington State.

Several communities, numerous structures and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Caldor, Eldorado NF, USFS. Unified command between NIMO (Team 2), IMT 1 (Cal Fire Team 2) and IMT 1 (CA Team 4). Sixteen miles northeast of Plymouth, CA. Timber, light slash and brush. Active fire behavior with isolated torching, creeping and smoldering. Several communities, numerous structures and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Monument, Shasta-Trinity NF, USFS. IMT 1 (CA Team 5). IMT 1 (NR Team 2) mobilizing. IMT is also managing the Knob incident. One mile southwest of Del Loma, CA. Timber and brush. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, torching and short-range spotting. Several communities, numerous structures and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Knob, Six Rivers NF, USFS. Two miles south of Willow Creek, CA. Timber and closed timber litter. Minimal fire behavior with backing, flanking and creeping. Communities of Willow Creek and Salyer and numerous residences threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

River Complex (2 fires), Klamath NF, USFS. NIMO (Team 3), transfer of command from IMT 2 (CA Team 13) to IMT 1 (CA Team 2) will occur tomorrow. Nine miles southwest of Etna, CA. Timber and brush. Extreme fire behavior with crowning, uphill runs and long-range spotting. Several communities, numerous structures and infrastructure threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

McCash, Six Rivers NF, USFS. IMT 2 (GB Team 7). Fourteen miles northeast of Somes Bar, CA. Timber, closed timber litter and brush. Active fire behavior with uphill runs, backing and short crown runs. Numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Antelope, Klamath NF, USFS. IMT 2 (CA Team 10). Twenty miles northeast of McCloud, CA. Timber and brush. Active fire behavior with short crown runs, long-range spotting and wind-driven runs. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Bridge, Nevada-Yuba-Placer Unit, Cal Fire. Two miles northeast of Auburn, CA. Chaparral, hardwood litter and timber. Minimal fire behavior with smoldering. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Twenty-five Mile, Okanogan-Wenatchee NF, USFS. IMT 1 (PNW Team 3). Twelve miles northwest of Chelan, WA. Short grass, brush and timber. Moderate fire behavior with flanking, backing and torching. Devil's Knob Complex (2 fires), Umpqua NF, USFS. IMT 1 (RM Team 1). Twenty miles northeast of Azalea, OR. Timber and medium slash. Moderate fire behavior with backing, flanking and single tree torching. Community of Ash Valley and structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Schneider Springs, Okanogan-Wenatchee NF, USFS. Transfer of command from IMT 1 (PNW Team 2) to IMT 2 (NW Team 10) will occur tomorrow. Eighteen miles northwest of Naches, WA. Short grass, timber and

brush. Active fire behavior with wind-driven runs, flanking and backing. Several communities and numerous structures threatened. Evacuations, area, road and trail closures in effect.

Summit Trail, Colville Agency, BIA. IMT 2 (SW Team 4). Seventeen miles west of Inchelium, WA. Timber and closed timber litter. Active fire behavior with flanking, single tree torching and short-range spotting.

Middle Fork Complex (2 fires), Willamette NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NW Team 6). Nine miles northeast of Oakridge, OR. Timber and light slash. Active fire behavior with backing, group torching and short-range spotting. Structures threatened. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Bull Complex, Mt. Hood NF, USFS. IMT 2 (NR Team 4). Twenty-five miles northeast of Mill City, OR. Timber and closed timber litter. Active fire behavior with flanking, backing and group torching. Area, road and trail closures in effect.

Predictive Services Discussion: An upper-level trough will break down the ridge over much of the West as an upper-low moves into the Northwest. A Pacific cold front will move through the Northwest and into the Northern Rockies and northern Great Basin. An upper-level trough will move over the Northeast, with another upper-level trough approaching the Great Lakes. Widespread showers with scattered thunderstorms are forecast across the interior Northwest, Idaho, and northwest Montana with wetting rain likely. Isolated to scattered mixed wet and dry thunderstorms will develop across the Sierra, Nevada, Utah, southern California, northern Arizona, and the central Rockies. Strong to severe outflow winds and hail are likely with some of the storms, with portions of eastern Oregon and western Idaho currently favored. Dry and breezy conditions are also likely along portions of the Sierra Front, the central Great Basin, and into Wyoming, the West Slope, and western South Dakota. There is potential for plume dominated wildfire behavior and pyrocumulonimbus development in far northern California, southern Oregon, and across much of the Great Basin into the West Slope.

It is fair to say that since the recognition of COVID-19 in March, our workforce has been in a Planning Level (PL5) level of reaction. We have been forced to adapt rapidly with ever-changing policies. This alone has created a stressful environment for many, and if you are feeling this way, you are not alone.

Our work as firefighters is not limited to wildfires any longer but has expanded to all risk, which brings even more exposure to stressful situations. Hurricanes, longer assignments, busier seasons, devastating fires...sound familiar? More time away from home and experiencing more stress can take its toll.

- **2 As a CREW**: Have each person on the crew write down three signs they exhibit when they are stressed as well as several things they enjoy doing to relieve stress.

Talking about stress can bring a crew/unit/team closer together, but it's not always easy to do. Consider discussing these questions to chat about stress and how to manage stress:

- How do you exhibit stress?
- Do co-workers have insights on how you exhibit stress?
- What stress-relief activities and strategies do you share with your co-workers?
